

## USEFUL INFORMATION IF GOING TO **RUSSIA** AS A TOURIST IN A PLEASURE CRAFT.

Demographic data (population/no of clubs/members/boats)	142 million inhabitants; Baltic part: 20 clubs with 2,000 members Number of pleasure boats in the Baltic Sea Russia – approx. 20,000 148 harbours including 20 marinas. 20 marinas in St Petersburg area. Between Vyborg and St. Petersburg 7 harbours are available for foreign boats. 3 harbours in the Kaliningrad area.
Currency	Russian Rouble. 1 Euro is about 70 Roubles (28 October 2015)
Formalities, Customs, passport control, visa	To apply for a tourist visa one needs to get a Voucher and a Confirmation from an authorised agency. Passport and Customs control may take a while unless one uses an agent/local representative. <b>Customs Posts - Fort Konstantin, Kronshtadt (59°59'.38N; 29°42'.31E). Vyborg (60° 42'.86N 28°43'.74E).</b> If assistance with the above formalities needed, feel free to contact Vladimir Ivankiv at <a href="mailto:vladimir@sailrussia.spb.ru">vladimir@sailrussia.spb.ru</a> Foreign visitors are recommended to inform Russian coast guard about the time and place of crossing the border via an agent/representative. One is expected to get a visa registered if one stays longer than one week.
Banned substances	<a href="https://www.erowid.org/psychoactives/law/countries/russia/law_russia_schedules.shtml">https://www.erowid.org/psychoactives/law/countries/russia/law_russia_schedules.shtml</a> To avoid possible complications during the customs procedure visitors are recommended to keep all their medicine in one kit, better with prescriptions and present it to the customs officer.
Boat's documents required	Customs Clearance requires the following: -Copy of a Crew List, 4 copies; -Copy of Skipper's Passport, 3 copies; -Copy of Skipper's Visa, 3 copies; -Certificate of Registry (alternatively – any legal paper that proves ownership – original document); -Copy of Certificate of Registry, 3 copies; -General Declaration (you get the form to fill in on arrival)
Insurance	Not required unless participating in local races
Legislation certificate of competence	Certificate of competence is required for all local pleasure boats. Visiting boats should comply with legislation in their own country.
Alcohol limits	0,16/ml
TSS, esp. new ones	TSS exist in the shipping lanes from south of Gogland for the approaches to Viborg and St. Petersburg.
Military exercise areas	<b>The ranges in the eastern Gulf of Finland.</b> No 3 (previously No 76) between Seskar Island and NE of Moschnyi Island No 114 NE of Gogland to the port side of the shipping lane close to the island Nos 105 and 107 Opposite Primorsk and south of Vyborg in the Bjoerk (Bjorke) Strait. <b>Prohibited Areas</b> No. 78 Between Gogland and Moshchnyi No. 75 area including O Seskar. All the areas are on the charts. Notifications are made on Navtex, VHF and Notice to Mariners There is a large military exercise area designated Area 117 off the coast of Kaliningrad. Mariners should check with the authorities to ascertain whether or not it is operational.
Major construction sites	The new bridge, part of the so called West Speedy Diameter, being built in the surroundings of both River and Krestovsky YCs may limit the visiting boats air draught to 25 metres.
Windfarms/wave and tidal energy projects	There are neither wind farms nor wave/tidal energy projects in Russia
Bridges	There are 342 bridges in the historical part of St.Petersburg of which 21 are opening bridges. They open at night to let the river traffic go first up the River and then the other way round.
Habitats and other protected areas	All the islands of the Eastern Part of the Gulf of Finland except for the Kotlin Island are not allowed to visit by pleasure boats

Flag traditions/ application of flag rules	Flag etiquette is known but in practice not strictly followed. Guests are expected to fly a courtesy flag under starboard spreader
Weather forecast	Russian yachtsmen normally use foreign weather sites such as <a href="http://www.windfinder.com">www.windfinder.com</a> or <a href="http://windguru.cz">windguru.cz</a>
Harbours	The following harbours in Russia are open to foreign pleasure boats in the Baltic Sea: Lavola YC, Favorit YC (two locations Vyborg), Johannes YC, Primorsk Yacht Pier, Bukhta Dubkovaya YC, Terijoki YC -St.Petersburg any accessible yacht club but River YC and Krestovsky YC are the main ones and accessible to masted craft. -Kaliningrad: Kaliningrad YC, Fishing Port. (Pionerskiy is currently closed – 2015).
Swinging mooring buoys for pleasure yachts	No swinging buoys
Anchoring and free access ashore	Anchoring is not allowed unless you are caught with real rough weather. Contact Russian coast guard on Ch.16 and ask for a refuge.
Good harbour manners	A quiet environment is expected after 2300
Safety in harbours	Yacht harbours are very secure. 24 hours guarding services provided
Rescue services	VHF Ch.16 working channels 71, 72, call sign “St.Petersburg Rescue Coordination Center” Tel. +7 812 3274147, +7 812 4958995, +7 812 7188995
Pyrotechnics	No regulations. Visiting boats should comply with legislation in their own country.
Staying during the winter	Winter storage is possible
Antifouling regulations	No regulations
Fuel availability	Fuel Stations available at major yacht harbours.
Gas availability	Propane Gas available but the gas station is too far away from the sea coast. It is strongly recommended to bring an extra bottle.
Pump out stations for sewage and oily water	Pumping sewage services are not available in local yacht harbours
Public transport	St.Petersburg: Metro, Tram, Trolleybus, Bus. Prices – around 0.4 to 0,8 Euros(March 2015); Vyborg, Kaliningrad: Buses. Price – around 0,6 Euro
Shopping hours	Supermarkets work 7 days a week, quite a few open for 24 hrs.

Practical advice	A lost Customs declaration is not replaceable; Do not take unmarked taxis; Do not make acquaintances without your Russian friend’s intermediary; Do not visit strangers’ flats; Do not convert big amounts into roubles unless you know how to spend it; Do not keep your money in bags, unlocked pockets etc. Medical insurance is advisable but not compulsory
